Her aunt goes away on business soon after Daisy arrives. The next day bombs go off as London is attacked and occupied by an unnamed enemy. As power fails, and systems fail, the farm becomes more isolated. Despite the war, it's a kind of Eden, with no adults in charge and no rules, a place where Daisy's uncanny bond with her cousins grows into something rare and extraordinary. But the war is everywhere, and Daisy's world will be turned upside down and a perfect summer will explode into a million bewildering pieces</p>




He uncovers a terrible secret: the Old Ones - monstrous godlike beings once banished from our world - are trying to return. Matt is about to discover that he alone stands between the forces of evil and the annihilation of humanity.</p>
<p><b><i>A Street Cat Named Bob</i></b></p> 	<p>James Bowen</p>	<p>When James Bowen found an injured, ginger street cat curled up in the hallway of his sheltered accommodation, he had no idea just how much his life was about to change. James was living hand to mouth on the streets of London and the last thing he needed was a pet. Yet James couldn't resist helping the strikingly intelligent tom cat, whom he quickly christened Bob. He slowly nursed Bob back to health and then sent the cat on his way, imagining he would never see him again. But Bob had other ideas. <p><b>The Gone series</b></p> 	<p>Michael Grant</p>	<p>Suddenly it's a world without adults and normal has crashed and burned. When life as you know it ends at 15, everything changes. In the blink of an eye all the adults disappear in a small town in southern California and no one knows why. Cut off from the outside world, those that are left are trapped, and there's no help on the way. They must do all they can to survive. Chaos rules the streets. Gangs begin to form. Sides are chosen - strong or weak.</p>
<p><b>The Ghosts of Heaven</b></p> 	<p>Marcus Sedgwick</p>	<p>This is a surprising book, just when you think you understand it, the unexpected taps you on the shoulder again. There are four quarters to this story; they travel across time, yet somehow are connected and can be read in any order. The writing is clever, each story has a main character, each one different to the one that has gone before, yet linked in a vital way. If you do choose to read the stories in a different order to the one the author has chosen, will your experience be different, will you have an altered understanding, will you feel the same when you turn the final page? Compelling yet often uncomfortable, sharp yet subtle, this will make you feel, think and question what you know.</p>
<p><b>Jane Eyre</b></p> 	<p>Charlotte Brontë</p>	<p>Orphaned as a young child, Jane Eyre has an unhappy start to life living with her cruel aunt and cousins and later enduring the hardships of Lowood school. After taking up a post as a governess, her life begins to improve, helped by her growing friendship with Mr Rochester, her surly employer. But can she achieve true happiness in a place filled with dark secrets?</p>

<p><b><i>The Three Musketeers</i></b></p> 	<p>Alexandre Dumas</p>	<p>The Three Musketeers tells the story of the early adventures of the young D'Artagnan and his three friends from the regiment of the King's Musketeers - Athos, Porthos and Aramis.</p> <p>Under the watchful eye of their patron M. de Treville, the four defend the honour of the regiment against the guards of Cardinal Richelieu, and the honour of the queen against the Cardinal himself as the power struggles of seventeenth century France are vividly played out in the background.</p> <p>But their most dangerous encounter is with the Cardinal's spy, Milady, one of literature's most memorable female villains.</p>
<p><b><i>Stone Cold</i></b></p> 	<p>Robert Swindells</p>	<p>Stone Cold is an exciting and disturbing thriller by Robert Swindells. A tense, exciting thriller combined with a perceptive and harrowing portrait of life on the streets as a serial killer preying on the young and vulnerable homeless. 17-year-old Link is distrustful of people until he pairs up with Deb, homeless like him. But what Deb doesn't tell him is that she's an ambitious young journalist on a self-imposed assignment to track down the killer and that she's prepared to use herself as bait...</p>
<p><b><i>Roll of Thunder</i></b></p> 	<p>Mildred D Taylor</p>	<p>The classic tale of growing up black in 1930s Mississippi. Racist attacks. Violence. Burnings. A lightning strike for your heart. Cassie's mother tells her that colour doesn't matter. Nobody is better than anyone else. But outside their cosy home in the Deep South, it's a different story. Blacks can't sit in the same bus seats as whites, or use the same water fountain. Sinister night riders roam the land, bringing death and terror. Worst of all: if you're black and you speak up, chances are someone you love will die violently. How will Cassie bear the injustice she sees all around her?</p>
<p><b><i>The Lord Of The Rings Trilogy</i></b></p> 	<p>J R R Tolkien</p>	<p>In the dark land of Mordor, evil sorcerer Sauron has gathered the Rings of Power which will give him total dominion over Middle Earth. Only one ring remains – one which must be destroyed at any cost. Meanwhile, in a sleepy village in the Shire, young Frodo Baggins finds himself entrusted with the missing Ring. They are shocked to discover their acquaintance with Mr Dickens will be through Mr Watts' inspiring reading of Great Expectations. But on an island at war, the power of fiction has dangerous consequences.</p> <p>Imagination and beliefs are challenged by guns. Mister Pip is an unforgettable tale of survival by story.</p>
